

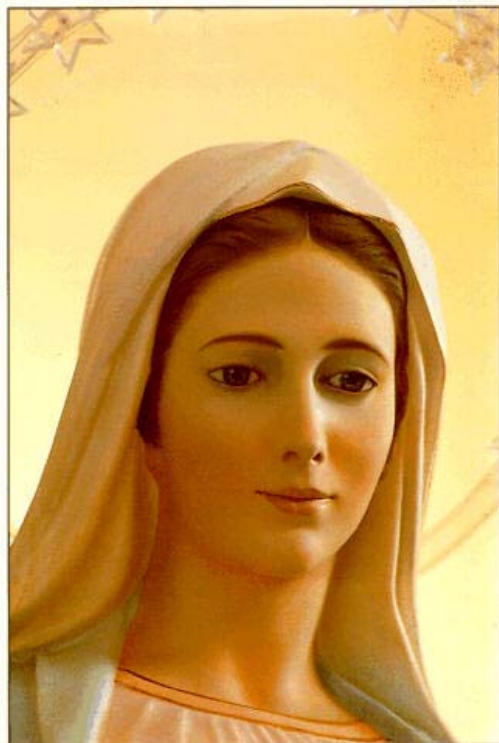

**St. Peter of Anagni, Bishop  
August 3**

Born in the eleventh century at Salerno, Italy, St. Peter became a Benedictine monk in his native city. In 1062, he was consecrated Bishop of Anagni by Pope Alexander II, at a time when the Pope found himself in Anagni because he had been chased out of Rome. This consecration was recommended by another monk, Hildebrand, the future Gregory VII. A few years later, Pope Gregory sent St. Peter to Constantinople as a legate. Upon returning to Anagni, the Saint undertook the construction of a great church that was to become the city's new cathedral. The work was interrupted when the Bishop left Europe with the First Crusade, which he followed to its triumphant conclusion. Upon returning to his diocese, St. Peter was able to complete the construction of the new church before his death in 1105. He was canonized in 1109 by Pope Paschal II.

## From the Pastor

Jesus took the five loaves, said the blessing, broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples.

The Gospels use these same sentences over and over. Matthew and Mark three times each. First and second are the scenes where the loaves feed thousands of people, distributed by the disciples as the crowds reclined in grassy fields, listening to the Lord. Luke and John have the scene only once each. Matthew and Mark give us two because one is for the Jewish people, and the other crowd are pagans. They imply that the Lord will feed everyone, not just a chosen few. All are invited to come to Him.

Also Matthew, Mark and Luke use these sentences at the Last Supper, as we do today at Mass. Here Jesus feeds His disciples themselves, and later through them He feeds the Church. But before He gives them the loaves, He says "This is my body." He immediately adds "Given up for you." So few words, yet how powerful their meaning!

The two different scenes, of feeding crowds of listeners looking to Jesus for guidelines for their lives and of giving Himself in the Eucharist to the disciples in the upper room, have strong similarities, and wildly differing results.

The God-man came to needy, hungry people. We need food to keep our bodies fueled and we need His wisdom and grace to enlighten and energize our choices and understanding of life. He loves us so much that satisfies our hungers, both physical and spiritual. It is worth noticing that our gospel today mentions that the crowd were all satisfied. Their stomachs were full and their hearts were calm and love-filled, we can easily imagine. The Shepherd Savior cares deeply.

The differences are infinite. Bread and fish are food, once alive but processed or killed to be eaten. The Eucharist is God Himself, Jesus Christ, body and soul, divine and human. There at the Last Supper, the people who received what He handed them and ate it, were amazed at what He was saying and doing. His body? His blood? And with the cup, He spoke of His blood being shed for the forgiveness of sins. What did they imagine that meant?

Even now, twenty centuries later our imaginations are challenged. What did the Apostles understand at

that Supper? Through the centuries, what did all the saints see in the Hosts they received? It is no surprise that all too many of our people today think the Eucharist is no more than bread or wine, symbols only. In a culture that looks to science as the ultimate proof of reality their minds are clouded from the far deeper proof of human values and relationships, to say nothing of our lives with God Himself.

The depth of impact, for example, of acts of self giving love to save another person from death or divorce or bankruptcy is clearly far greater than any chemical, physical or biological principles. Trying to prove the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist is physically impossible. Yet countless instances of the effects in love and miracles and happiness because of Communion with Him in this great Sacrament have become compelling proof that something is beyond our senses, that Someone is visiting His people, that God is doing something to enrich the lives of His beloved people.

Far too many times, we receive and consume the Host while distracted by the persons around us or the day's schedule. This is understandable, but if anything, it points out the real need to prepare better to receive Him. Speaking simply, we invite Jesus to manifest Himself. He is God, and does His own thing. He knows what is best. He amazes us by communicating in clear, though indirect, ways. He challenges us by more often remaining silent. The bottom line is that the Eucharist is Christ. He comes to feed you.
